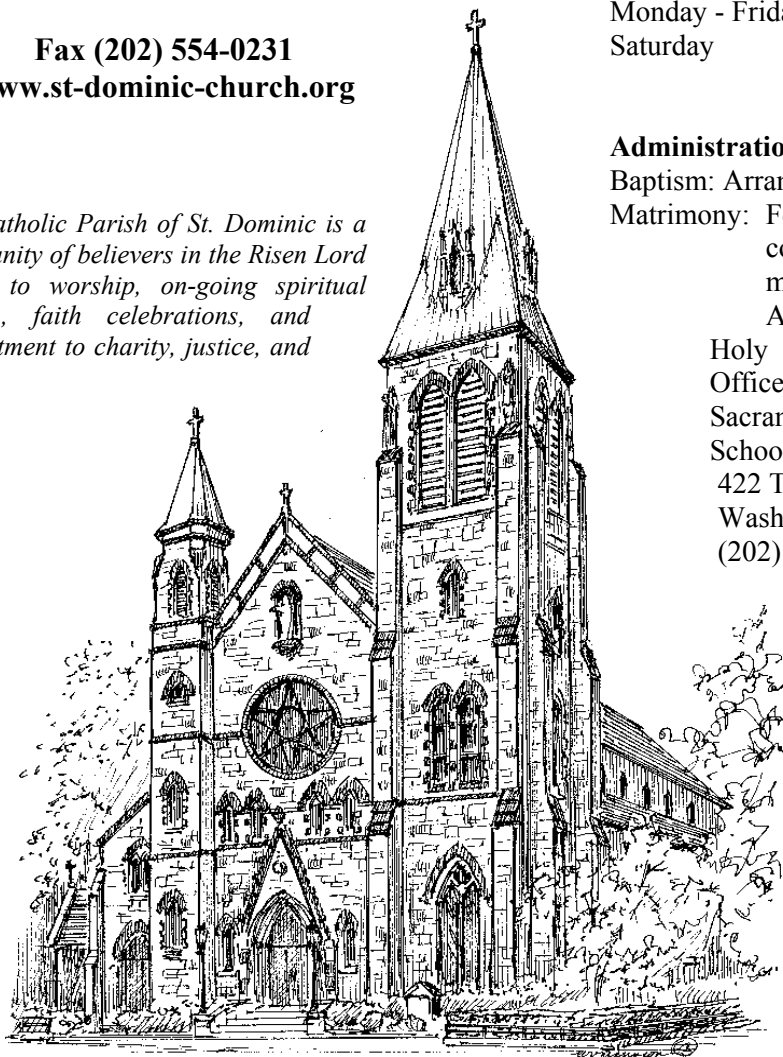

Pastor's Corner

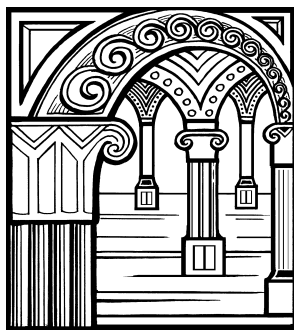
As you may have noticed, the parking meters outside the church are now in use on Saturdays through 6:30 p.m.. This means that when you come to Mass on Saturday you are now required to pay for parking.

I have written to Mayor Fenty and DC Council Chairman Gray regarding this situation and have asked them to help to find a way to ameliorate the situation by exempting parishioners from this unnecessary financial burden to worship here or to change the hours of the meters back to the way they were before the new times came into effect.

I will keep you apprised of this situation via the Pastor's Corner. Until this is resolved, you will be required to pay for the time on the meter for Saturday night Mass.

The Liturgy of the 4th Sunday of Ordinary Time

This week's second reading from Corinthians is continued from last week where we heard how each person's gifts, although they differ, are essential to the building up of the kingdom. This week the ultimate message is shared: over all of these gifts, we must first put on love. Let the familiar, yet timely, words of Paul be proclaimed at all meetings and rehearsals this week as a reminder of who we are and who we are called to be.

In *Faith and the Future: Essays on Theology, Solidarity and Modernity* (Maryknoll, NY: Orbis, 1995), theologian Johannes Metz introduced the terms "bourgeois" and "messianic" to help describe types of approaches to religion. "Bourgeois" religion adapts the Gospel to first-world society with no tension between society's values and Gospel living. "Messianic" religion challenges us to see God in his crucified Christ, thus standing in the face of society's values. Capuchin Franciscan Father Edward Foley (well known author and composer) says that although liturgy that is tranquil with pleasant hymns and agreeable prayers might be our preference, it is far from authentic Christian worship: "Christian worship is a disturbing event: God is present among us; God calls us to recognize sin, to embrace our enemies, to transform our lives and to announce the kingdom in the world." These differing approaches are worthy of prayerful thought and evaluation when applied to how we view and live our Christian lives. Father Foley reminds us that we need both approaches and that God will guide us if we open our minds and hearts. © OCP, 2006

31 de enero de 2010**

Estimada Comunidad Hispana:

En el relato sobre la vocación profética de Jeremías se manifiestan varias características de su personalidad: sensibilidad, incertidumbre, timidez... Ahí aparece como el llamado divino abarca todo el ser del hombre, desde la predestinación (“antes de formarte en el seno materno”) hasta la consagración y la designación oficial como “profeta de las naciones.”

La experiencia humana de Jeremías, lanzado a la aventura de profetizar en nombre de Dios, esta entretejida en una secuencia dramática de sufrimientos, aislamiento y contra dicciones. Una vida que es pues, “signo de contradicción”; ya que él será “objeto de pleitos y controversias para todo el mundo”, como dirá mas tarde. Pero el Señor no deja jamás solo a su profeta... Tal es la declaración final del pasaje que hoy leemos “Lucharan contra ti pero no te vencerán, porque yo estoy contigo para salvarte”.

Jeremías signo de contradicción en su propio pueblo, es como una anticipación profética de Jesús, signo de contradicción en su tierra, Nazaret, donde pronuncia su primer discurso programático, al que Lucas atribuye un especial importancia. Los habitantes de Nazaret esperaban más bien un show taumátúrgico de parte de este paisano “hijo de José”. que ha subido in esperadamente a los honores de la crónica. A esta luz, los nazaretanos se vuelven como un símbolo de todo Israel, que busca signos y prodigios, que quiere milagros y pruebas, deduciendo así la fe a magia y espectáculo.

Jesús, que se ha presentado como el profeta definitivo, se refiere a la suerte que corrieron los grandes del pasado, Elías y Eliseo, obligados a buscar fuera la fe que el pueblo escogido no quería ofrecer a Dios. Para Israel también Jesús es ‘piedra de tropiezo’, fastidiosa; pero más tarde Jesús dirá; “La piedra que desecharon los constructores se ha convertido en piedra angular”

En este nuevo edificio, cuyo fundamento es Jesucristo, entran los creyentes, los que son llamados, “tanto judíos como paganos” según San Pablo.

Jesús nos invita a creer en El en esta Eucaristía que nos ayude a vivir con más entusiasmo su vía. (Según C. Soltero, SJ *Actualidad litúrgica* n. 212)
